DESCRIPTION: Autism is the fastest-growing neurological disorder in the world. In the US, one in every 44 children is diagnosed with Autism. This workshop will focus on explaining autism in everyday language and dispelling common myths about autism including causes, characteristics, and impact. Participants will also learn about treatment options, resources, and best practices in behavior management and positive learning supports.









#### COMMUNITY SPOTLIGHT

Regional Transition Navigator Services (RTNS) Thursday, January 19, 12 pm - 12:30 pm

PRESENTER: Rebekah M. Gletner, Regional Transition Administrator, Regional Transition Navigator Services, Center for Excellence in Disabilities (CED), West Virginia University (WVU)

**DESCRIPTION:** Regional Transition Navigator Services (RTNS) is an initiative at the WVU Center for Excellence in Disabilities to support struggling youth between the ages of 14 and 25. The RTNS team works directly with at-risk youth and young adults to address their needs as they move toward independence. This can include assistance with challenges such as housing, employment, mental health and/or recovery services, academic support, food insecurity, and more. The eligibility requirements include, they must be 14 to 25 years of age, must live in the state of West Virginia, and must be facing, or have a history of, Severe Mental Illness (SMI), Substance Use Disorder (SUD), and/or fear of becoming homeless. Their services are free, and referrals can be made through the RTNS website. This info session will provide more details about the program and how to refer for services.

We invite you to learn about ACES, and the impact ACES have on brain development and behavior. ACES often interfere with school success and can negatively impact participation in activities, events, school, relationships, overall wellness, and life outcomes. This ACES training series is intended to help caregivers and adults who serve youth better understand the impact of ACES and to learn some best-practice strategies to help youth and families overcome and prevent the future occurrence of ACES, changing lives in a positive direction.

DESCRIPTION: The WV ESMH Initiative exists so that every student in West Virginia can benefit from a school environment that supports social and emotional well-being to achieve his or her full potential. Schools, families, and strategic community partners assume a shared responsibility to provide mental health support for ALL students. ESMH includes prevention, early intervention, and treatment that are naturally integrated into the school day, so students do not have to leave school to get the support they need. This spotlight will help you understand ESMH, determine

if it is in your local school, and how to best help students benefit.

**TRAINER:** Dr. Barb Brady - Executive Director, Inspiring Dreams Network

**DESCRIPTION:** Supportive, caring relationships are critical building blocks for healthy youth development and the heart of what youth need to learn, grow, and thrive. Relationships provide an environment of trust, positive reinforcement, good modeling, and constructive feedback for social-emotional and intellectual growth. This presentation covers researched best practices in establishing healthy adult/youth relationships and the role of adult mentors/coaches in helping youth identify and connect with protective factors and build resilience. (This workshop has been broken down into 2 smaller units to accommodate participant schedules.)

#### Youth Mental Health First Aid

Youth Mental Health First Aid (YMHFA) is a skills-based training course that teaches participants about common adolescent mental health issues and teaches a five-step process on how to identify, understand



and respond to these youth issues. Those who successfully complete the course earn a **Mental Health First Aider Certificate**.

This YMHFA training is very interactive and engaging, teaching a 5-step action plan for how to help young people (ages 12 - 18) in both crisis and non-crisis situations. Come prepared to have fun and learn how to better interact with and support middle and high-school-age youth with mental health needs.



Regrounding Our Response (RORWV): Helping Change the Trajectory of the Opioid Epidemic to Improve Outcomes for Families

DESCRIPTION: When caregiver outcomes improve so do outcomes for youth. That is why Inspiring Dreams Network (IDN) chose to be part of this initiative and has trained presenters for each component of this training. The Regrounding Our Response West Virginia (RORWV) initiative supports a multi-disciplinary network of Master Presenters across the state trained in five core concepts: Stages of Change, Adverse Childhood Experiences, Social Determinants of Health, Medically Assisted Treatments, and Comprehensive Health Framework. This training is crucial to addressing the stigma around substance use, raising awareness about public health approaches, improving treatment approaches, optimizing services, reducing substance-related overdoses, and improving outcomes for WV families. Participants may participate in up to three of the training components during our full-day in-person event as some topics run concurrently. IDN provides trainers and is a co-sponsor of this training event.

believed. Our brains, our relationships, and our community are all interconnected. Science tells us that relationships have the power to shape our brains. Relationships help us learn better, work better, and parent better. When we experience tough times, they help us heal. With each positive connection, we develop a healthier, stronger community. This session uses video, discussion, and experiential activities to engage participants in exploring connections to build stronger, more connected communities to support youth and families.

**ABOUT THIS OVERVIEW:** This training will provide an overview of Inspiring Dreams Network's (IDN) Success Coaching and Mentoring reform-focused, advocacy model. This overview is designed for school and community mentoring program leaders. This intro will provide information for them to decide if they have the interest, staff, and funding to implement the program.

WHO IS INVITED: School and organizational leaders interested in providing success coaching to middle and high school students in the six-county region of The Greater Kanawha Valley Foundation (Boone, Clay, Kanawha, Fayette, Lincoln, and Putnam). Also invited are interested county leaders from counties served by the *Mountain State Educational Services Cooperative*.

ABOUT OUR MODEL: Success coaches practice transformative leadership and support by first building a relationship of trust, truth, and empowerment. Our focused concepts and steps are designed to transform students from the status of "at-risk of academic failure" to a trajectory of improvement and empowerment. Our success coaching model focuses on clear and tangible steps of student engagement, grit, perseverance, and responsible reactive behavior choices. These practices help students to witness the correlation between these steps and improvement, leading them to believe that success is possible for them.

Those who commit to the training will then participate in a two-day intensive workshop and be provided with a year of follow-up consultations and support by IDN. The trainings are culturally responsive and evidence-based -- a hybrid model of standards from the University of Minnesota's Check and Connect Program and the United States Department of Education's Graduation 2020 Program.

IDN's highly professional success coaching trainers embody the vision of supporting youth in reaching success in education in the direction of their passion so that they may achieve their dreams. During the work, success coaches often observe specific needs of their mentees and are skilled in recognizing and carrying out referral procedures with the utmost discretion.
